# Annual Report 2016-2017

#### 5. Reserve Management Maintenance

Maintenance work undertaken this year included: up-keep of walkways (including forest road, Eskrigg Farm road, woodland walks, mountain bike trail, Reserve path and boardwalk); clearing of waterways (including feeder burn, by-pass burn, drainage ditches, culverts, silt-trap and pond); cleaning and treatment of timber structures (including fences, signs, way-markers, interpretation boards, hides and Centre); gathering of litter and clearance of dog dirt. There was also the daily up-keep of the Centre, toilet and wildlife feeding stations.

# Pondlife

Several years ago, some well-meaning person introduced Canadian Pondweed (*Elodea canadensis*) to the pond and it quickly took over and smothered out the native submergent and emergent vegetation. Volunteers have been attempting to keep this invasive species under control ever since. At some point last winter, the Canadian Pondweed all died out, leaving no vegetation for the pond animals to feed on this year. The result was a dramatic decline in the numbers and range of animal species in the pond. The reason for the death of the pondweed is not clear. Several explanations have been suggested. One possible explanation is that some form of pollutant got into the water. Another possibility is that there are now far too many duck on the pond and their excreta is fouling the water. The situation is being constantly monitored and it is hoped that the native plant species will recolonise the pond in time.

#### **Country Code**

There have been very few incidents of vandalism during the past year. However, there have been several incidents of inconsiderate or anti-social behaviour, where people do not follow the country code.

#### Wildlife Records

1239 species have been identified in Eskrigg Nature Reserve and Woodland Walks since the Reserve was opened in May 1988. These include 223 species of fungi (34 new this year), 301 species of moth (18 new this year), 100 species of beetle (mostly identified this year by Bob Merritt), 46 species of spiders, 96 species of birds (76 in the past year) and 20 species of mammals (12 in the past year).

# Part 2 – Treasurer's Report

# Notes on the Annual Receipts and Payments Account Summary

## Receipts

# 1. Membership

This year, the income from membership fees was up slightly, by £37, on the previous year. 44 of the 120 members also signed up for Gift Aid.

## 2. Donations

The major donations, from the Co-op and E.on, are listed separately from the other donations. When combined, like last year, the total would have been  $\pounds 4,067.53$  - a drop of  $\pounds 1,263.67$  on last year.

## 3. Sale of Christmas Cards, Nature Notelets and Calendars

Last year the sale of these items at the Xmas Lights event and at the Tesco Stall were lumped together. This year the proceeds from the sale of these items are listed separately, allowing us to keep a better record of the income from each item.

This year the profit from the sale of calendars was approximately £1,295.

## 4. Additional Fund Raisers

Unlike last year, Jim was able to carry out the usual collection on Gala Day, join in with the Lockerbie and District Rotary Club Charity Walk and raise a total of £542.06.

#### Payments

#### 1. Animal Food

The cost of squirrel and bird food was high, up £581.85 on last year. There are two main reasons for this, the increase in the purchase price of the food and an increase in the amount of food consumed (more duck on the pond). In November 2016, we applied for assistance from the Lockerbie Trust, just as we had in the past, but the Lockerbie Trust has yet to meet to discuss the application.

#### 2. Servicing and repairs

The reason for the higher than normal cost for repairs is that the road trailer had to have its suspension renewed. The trailer is now 28 years old and has served us well. However, the suspension was damaged a few years ago when a fork lift driver working for James Jones was loading a pallet of timber. From then on the suspension had steadily deteriorated. Replacing the suspension was, however, much cheaper than replacing the whole trailer. Members of the Trust replaced the floor of the trailer. The trailer should now continue to serve the Trust for many years to come.

# 3. Terram membrane (from M.W.Plant) and Gravel from Grange Quarry

A lot of time and effort this year has been put in to upgrading the woodland walks to hard-core paths as part of Phase 4 of the 'Access For All' project. The membrane and gravel were needed for this project. The cost would have been even higher if Grange Quarry had not generously donated a load of gravel. Thanks are also due to Lockerbie Academy who contributed two loads of gravel for the work done by the Employability Course students in May 2017.

#### 4. Reserve Manager's Expenses

These were approximately £500 higher than last year for three reasons:

- 1. because of the extra petrol needed for the quad bike in order to transport the gravel for the paths.
- 2. the cost of wood preservative (bought at The Range in Carlisle because it was unavailable at D & W Ironmongery at the time).
- 3. the main difference was due to the way the Annual Trust outing to the Scottish Seabird Centre was organised.

The entry fees and travel costs were paid, by those who went on the trip, into the Trust account - see the £500 under visit to Seabird Centre on the receipts page.

However, Mr. Rae had to pay the £346 for entry to the Scottish Seabird Centre in advance of the Annual Outing using his Visa card over the phone. This sum was later reclaimed from the Trust as a Reserve Manager's expense. The Trust paid the ATI for the hire of the minibus directly.

#### **Summary**

#### Lockerbie Wildlife Trust has had another financially successful year.

At the start of the year we brought forward £3,773.68 and we finished the year with a credit balance of £5,801.47. This will enable us to retain £1,500 in the contingency fund (Project Account) and still have £4,300 in working capital in order to continue the development of Eskrigg Nature Reserve and Woodland Walks. The Executive Committee recognises that some of the Interpretation Boards are in need of replacement and this will be done, one at a time, as the funds become available.

This report has been prepared by me on behalf of the Trustees. I wish to thank Kathryn Hughes, once again, for her meticulous book keeping and the clarity of the Receipts and Payments statements.

### Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Lockerbie Wildlife Trust

I am reporting on the accounts of the Lockerbie Wildlife Trust (SC005338) for its financial year which ended on the 31<sup>st</sup> August 2017, and which are set out in the accompanying Trustees' Annual Report.
