

a. Birds:

JR

Blackbird, Blue Tit, Buzzard, Carrion Crow, Chaffinch, Coal Tit, Dunnock, Goldcrest, Goldfinch, Great Spotted Woodpecker, Great Tit, Greenfinch, Jay, Kestrel, Long-tailed Tit, Mallard, Moorhen, Mute Swan, Nuthatch, Pheasant, Red Kite, Robin, Siskin, Sparrowhawk, Stock Dove, Tawny Owl, Treecreeper, Woodcock, Woodpigeon, Wren.



b. Mammals:

Bank Vole, Hare, Mole, Red Squirrel, Roe Deer, Stoat.

4. Construction and Maintenance Work during January.



Fri. 6 Jim Rae raked up the leaves from the reserve paths.

Tue. 10 Scott McLean made adjustments to the door to the Red Squirrel Hide to help it close.

Mon. 16 Tom Hargreaves helped Jim fill up some of the potholes on the Eskrigg Farm road.

Tue. 17 Noah Nightingale helped Jim fill up the bird feeders.





Wed. 18 Dead Red Squirrel found in wood next to Eskrigg Reserve and left in secure place for Jim.

Thu. 19 Jim confirmed that the squirrel had died from the squirrel pox and buried the body. **Jim** then took down all the squirrel and bird feeders in order to sterilize them. The squirrel feeders will be kept down for 4 weeks and then only put back up if there are no more cases of squirrel pox in the meantime. The bird feeders were put back up the next day.

Fri. 20 Gordon Reid helped Jim fill up the remaining potholes on the farm road.





Thu. 26 Noah helped Jim fill up some of the potholes on the forest road.

Sat. 28 Joe Borthwick and **Jim** carried out the Saturday Morning Dog Poo Patrol, filled the remaining potholes on the forest road with gravel, then picked up the litter around the woodland walks.
